From Issue 77 February 1995 We still have lots of fund raising events here in Kilve and a report back in 1995 read as follows:-



#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

#### from Alan Keen

One effect on us as we run up to the general election has been that our district and county councillors were both absent from our November meeting. Apparently they are not allowed to attend during an election campaign but Hugh Davies, as always, provided us with written information. I can only assume that their party political connections are suddenly raging and that we would be in grave danger of being subverted one way or the other. Lucky us -salvation when you least expect it.

The fate of the Chantry seems to be in good hands. Cllr Barry Whitehead invited Annie Evans of Historic England to our last meeting to provide us with an update. The good news is that the site should be open to the public late next year. There's been a delay in removing the large steel structure supporting the south wall as it has to be supported by new internal steel reinforcement, which is a specialist's task.

Teaching cats to cook is easier than dealing with SCC Highways, so hats off to Cllr Mark Walton for continuing the quest to make the A39 through Kilve safe. The HPC Community mitigation fund and Avon and Somerset road safety fund have been identified as possible sources of funding for improvements, with help from Hugh Davies. We need the support of the community on this one. Only a fatal accident or two would be likely to move SCC Highways from their present position, which seems to be one of do nothing as it avoids spending money.

On the web front Cllr Steve Collins has approached Somerset County Council for help. They have agreed to not only host our village and PC sites but to build prototype sites for us. This is great news as we want to improve the internet profile of the village. Look at Holford Village website to get an idea of where we are heading. At this point I would like to extend the usual time honoured seasonal best wishes to Cllrs Elizabeth Grigg, Steve Collins, Mark Walton, Pat Woolley, Barry Whitehead, Peter Gill and our Clerk Shirley Rushent and thank them for being Kilve Parish Council. And as 2019 comes to an end we wish you, our village community, well and good cheer over the Christmas and New Year celebrations - after all, 2020 is going to be a good one, isn't it?

# SEA LANE SPIRIT

Last year, I often took memories from my youth in Somerset as themes for my column. I am now going to highlight a time of my life where I was most fortunate.

I graduated in Mathematics at Bristol in the summer of 1950, did two years National Service in Coastal Command being demobbed on October 10th 1952. Doreen had trained as a teacher, and got a job as a teacher in Lancashire (Rawtenstall) starting in September, and I said I'd get something near at hand when I was demobbed – so we got married in August of that year.

Doreen had an uncle in Hollinwood, on the edge of Manchester and Oldham (where there were 270 tall factory chimneys: a far cry from Somerset!), so I started by calling their personnel Department on October 16th, and they invited me to call and see them the following morning.

There I was met by the Manager Mr Lunt (it's strange how one can remember odd things from 67 years ago) and he told me that he had two possibilities in mind. One was on the shop floor – I think it was a sort of trainee for the Transformer Division – and one in the Instrument Division. If I was interested in the second one, I would have to go there first, because the gentlemen who would interview me were going out. I hadn't got much option, so I was whisked away in a car for about a couple of miles, where there was a much more modern building with no tall chimney.

I hadn't any idea what the job was, but at the end of half-an-hour grilling when we didn't talk about mathematics, but instead followed some logical arguments, they offered me a job as computer programmer. Of course, at that stage I had no idea what a computer programmer was – and neither did almost everyone in the country. In fact, we didn't have any idea what a computer was.

There were only three in the whole of the UK, and the other two were simply research models: the one in Manchester had been engineered by Ferranti from the research model at the University. Ferranti were offering the computer for sale and were setting up a team to explore the potential problems which it could solve. This was being funded largely by the Government through research bodies.

The first few days at Ferranti changed not just my life, but my view of tackling problems. There was a realisation that as long as you could define – in logical terms – a procedure, then you could build equipment to do that work. Of course, you then realised that defining the procedure was a lot more difficult than it seemed! I have been asked to give a talk in London in January about what it was like learning about computer programming on a machine which would just fit in the Village Hall at Kilve.

So when you look at your latest phone, or tablet, before slipping it in your pocket, remember that we started with equipment which used 4,000 valves, used 27 kilowatts of power and had to be cooled by ducted air.

The University computer suite was in the middle of Manchester, yet when programmers used it at weekends, you were on your own with £100,000 worth of equipment. We never locked the door as we left – and I don't think there was a case of vandalism or deliberate dam-

#### THANK YOU AND WELCOME!

#### 'Good Health!'

In my introduction to this issue, I extended to you New Year greetings including the words 'Good Health', so I thought for my derivation of phrases this month 'Good Health' might be rather appropriate. Why do we say 'Good Health' when we are about to drink alcohol, which is far from good for us? The answer lies in 19th century England and the deadly outbreak of cholera between 1848 and 1849. in particular. In August 1849 cholera reached epidemic proportions in the



Broadwick Street area of Soho in London, resulting in 344 deaths in only four days. But there were almost none in the neighbouring areas. Local physician, Dr John Snow, suggested cholera was linked to drinking polluted water and proved this when he found that 87 victims, out of the 89 he examined, were known to have drunk from the Broadwick Street well. Snow called for the authorities to take the handle off the pump and almost immediately the outbreak was halted. For a long while afterwards the locals would avoid water and drink only ales and wines. When drinking they would toast each other with 'to your good health' knowing they were safe from the disease. Appropriately enough there is a pub called the 'John Snow' on Broadwick Street to this very day.
