As our supply chain is largely local, we are hopeful that we will not experience disruption, but the obvious caveats apply - including us and our staff being in a position to serve! We would ask that orders are either emailed to mfhirst@hotmail.com or phoned through in the morning ideally on 01278741214. We will endeavour to deliver same day but, if your order includes fresh produce it will most likely be next day delivery so we can order in fresh items for you. Payment can be made by cheque or cash, or if you are a regular Kilve Stores customer, we can open an account at the shop for you, and payment can be made later. If possible and if safe to do so, I am happy to bring groceries into your house. Otherwise goods will be left on the doorstep or agreed safe place to minimise contact. You can also place orders for friends or relatives to collect if that helps to manage time as well. We can also deliver coal, logs, kindling and gas. We respectfully ask that the order values are over £10 - £20. Unfortunately, we will not be offering a newspaper only delivery service. Having just typed out the article below about the 'Food


Cupboard' I thought this phrase might be appropriate for this month's 'Derivation of phrases'.

American phrase, which travelled across the Atlantic in the 1870's. Around that time a celebrated bakery, run by the Fleischman family in New York, was famous for the quality and freshness of its bread. The reason was that all the bread was baked in the morning and any left over at the end of each day was given to the poor and starving for free, rather than kept for the following day's customers. A queue, in America, is known as a line, so at the end of each day a 'breadline' would form outside the premises.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

This month I'll report briefly on some works in progress.

The VE day memorial bench has been delivered – a very good deal negotiated with some vigour by Ween. This will shortly be installed in the car park area at Kilve Beach along with Bette Gill's lilac bushes.

The village pond halfway down Sea Lane has in recent years returned to nature – not a state that everyone in the village is happy with. However, the pond is owned by Mr and Mrs Scott who need considerable assistance in order to do anything about it. To this end the PC has enlisted the aid of Iain Porter, who is a development officer with Quantock Hills AONB Service. Mr Porter has been given a guided tour of the pond area by parish councillors and has come back to us with an optimistic assessment of the site's potential along with the possibility of financial assistance. So watch this space.

Lagger Hill and the adjacent stretch of the A39 has provided us with a road safety problem for a number of years. We've been trying for a long time to get Somerset County Council to recognise that this stretch of road is a hazard. To this end Kate Brown, a Traffic Engineer with Somerset County Council, met with parish councillors at Lagger Hill on the A39 to assess the situation. We expected the usual negative approach but were surprised when Ms Brown said that the road markings could be altered to make it more obvious that the road is narrow and has no verges. Another space to watch. The ongoing Kilve Court land lease situation has at last moved closer to resolution. The respective solicitors are now involved and as far as we know there's nothing to prevent us leasing the land for the next 20 years at a nominal cost of £1. Of course, we have to pay for solicitors and a fence around the land, but to offset this Hugh Davies has been able to secure a grant of £1000 specifically towards this project.

Following Famous Tyre-tracks

The card marking my 'big' birthday last year, neatly addressed to 'Uncle Pete', contained quite a challenge! My wider family had put their heads together and presented me with a voucher for a one-hour 'taster session' on the track at the Olympic VeloPark, Stratford. East London.

A wonderful idea but there were two immediate and practical problems. I don't remember ever having ridden a fixed-wheel bike (standard on a race-track) and I have certainly never been on the specially boarded track at a banked velodrome of the sort that beckoned.

A colleague in the Bridgwater Cycling Club kindly offered the loan of a 'fixie' for as long as I wanted which proved to be a real bonus. Despite the wet and dreary weather in recent months I got used to having to pedal <u>all</u> the time the bike was moving — especially downhill.

And so to the big test! I presented myself at the Velodrome at the appointed time, changed and walked through the tunnel under the track. Then, heart in mouth, emerged onto the central area where so many of the 'greats' had been pictured on tv, preparing to 'go for gold'.

I was part of a group of twelve, very mixed in all ways – age, size and ability. Our excellent coach firstly ensured the bikes we chose from the racks were suitably sized; checked that the hire shoes were properly adjusted to the pedals and spelt out the basic rules of being on the track.

First and foremost we had to 'ride fast'. It became obvious why when attempting to go round the end banking (42 degrees) – anything less than maximum effort meant a tendency to drift to the bottom of the track. It was also important to 'hold your line' and not impede others.

All in all it was an exhilarating experience. I covered 32 laps which at 250 metres a time equates to 8 kilometres. It was tiring — I will admit to stopping, holding on to the central rail, a couple of times for a breather and didn't venture all the way up the banking (scary!).

Despite my best efforts, I'm afraid that no speed records were even remotely challenged. I am absolutely delighted to have overcome my initial fears and put my inexperience behind me - I might even do it again if the Club makes one of its visits to the Newport Velodrome ... we'll see!
